



East Sussex Better Together Issue 10: September 2015

A briefing for staff, local people, service providers and other stakeholders

East Sussex's four health and social care commissioning organisations - the three clinical commissioning groups (CCGs) and East Sussex County Council (ESCC) - are working together with local people and stakeholders to transform local health and care services.

Around £935 million is spent on these services every year. While our budget is likely to stay about the same, demand and costs will continue to rise. To meet this challenge we are changing the way we organise services to ensure high quality and affordable care now and for future generations.

Our shared ambition is that within three years there will be a fully integrated health and social care system locally that will ensure every patient or service user enjoys proactive, joined up care that supports them to live as independently as possible and achieve the best possible outcomes.

East Sussex Better Together is our 150 week transformation programme to achieve this bold ambition.

The *East Sussex Better Together* partners are busy working together with patients, clients, providers and other local stakeholders to deliver integrated health and social care services locally through the <u>6+2 box model of care</u>:

East Sussex Better Together workshops and events

Two services moving even closer to full integration

Health and Social Care Connect

The team has started to extend its provision, which is <u>already offered to GPs and all health and</u> <u>social care professionals</u>. This county-wide service has details of all community-based services and can now:

- Refer into community health services from 8am to 10pm every day of the week
- Access information and advice, social care assessments and simple services from 8.30am to 5pm, Monday to Friday.

After more training and development in their new roles, staff will start to offer assessments and coordinate simple services, urgent packages of care and urgent respite (which is currently offered via the Emergency Duty Service) outside of core hours and at weekends. Here are the roles within the team:

- Practice managers overseeing the day-to-day activity of the service
- Senior Practitioners (qualified occupational therapists or social workers) supervising frontline staff and supporting decisions on cases.
- Clinical Nurse Advisors (qualified District Nurses) providing specialist support for HSCC staff and enquirers
- Access and Assessment officers (AAO) handling enquiries along with Access and Assessment Coordinators (AAC). AACs will shortly begin to hold sessions at certain GP practices where practice staff can 'drop-in' to get immediate help with more complex cases. This AAC pilot is starting in October and running until April when it will be reviewed.

• Integrated Health and Social Care Teams

The process to appoint eight single line managers for our eight new <u>integrated health and social</u> <u>care teams</u> is underway. Discussions are taking place with existing managers, <u>community</u> <u>providers</u> and staff as part of a formal consultation process which lasts several weeks.

We will be working with the managers to develop the integrated teams, ensuring that we are drawing on current skills and expertise as well as introducing new ways of working and maintaining existing levels of service.

Better advice and information for BSL users

Working with DeafCOG, an umbrella organisation that hosts activities and projects of value to the Deaf community, we are looking at what we can do to make information and advice easier for BSL (British Sign Language) users. This is part of work to meet the NHS accessible information standard, and also forms part of the Care Act requirements. Over the next few months staff will be looking at how people get information on our website, in print and on the phone so that they can make improvements. Caring for older adults in their communities

The Community Geriatrician Service will be supporting patients, their GPs and other professionals in the community across East Sussex to identify and manage older people, those with long term conditions and those with frailty. We want to care for people in their communities, and reduce their admissions to hospital. Consultant geriatricians make this possible by reviewing patients for health and social care teams, and directing patients between primary and acute (hospital) care.

Since August, Dr Henry Alexander, Consultant Geriatrician, has been providing additional support for intermediate care beds at Lewes Victoria Hospital. Dr Alexander participates in the weekly multidisciplinary team meeting, reviews patients of concern and provides advice and support to nursing and therapy staff and GPs. This is one example of current work to develop this service and provides extra medical support to that already in place.

The CCGs are working with local hospital trusts to extend this service by recruiting more Community Geriatricians across the county as soon as possible. Further planning around a potential network of support provided by specialist nurses is also being considered by Eastbourne, Hailsham and Seaford CCG and Hastings and Rother CCG to ensure there are no gaps in providing this service.

Accountable care? It's about the difference we make to people's lives

For many years our funding has concentrated on what services are to be delivered, at what price and at what time, with sometimes little measurement of outcomes. Now we are looking to shift the emphasis from what services are provided to the difference they have made.

It is making us think differently about how we plan and allocate resources in health and social care and we call it Accountable Care We've prepared a discussion paper which we hope will start conversations and build a picture about what it could look like in East Sussex. Our programme board is meeting to discuss this on 4 November 2015 and members have asked us to canvass views to inform their discussion.
